The past decade has seen open access emerge as a disruptive innovation in scholarly communication. It is accelerating the pace of scientific discovery, encouraging innovation and enriching education. It is also drawing attention to the unsustainable costs and other harmful effects of the paywall-based economic model of academic publishing. The EU and USA have now adopted sweeping Open Access requirements for publicly funded research. In Canada the tricouncils are developing their own Open Access policy. McMaster is considering signing the Berlin Declaration on Open Access.

This Colloquium is an opportunity for students, researchers and librarians to engage in a wide-ranging discussion of the challenges and opportunities due to the enormous changes in academic communication and in society, led by international experts on Open Access publishing and new forms of digital communication.
